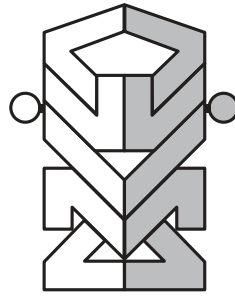

The Environmental Defence Society (EDS) and the New Zealand Institute of Landscape Architects (NZILA) have pleasure in inviting you to Reclaiming our Heritage: the New Zealand Landscape Conference.

New Zealand has a huge diversity of outstanding landscapes, ranging from our long and magnificent coastline to the peaks of the High Country. These places help define us as New Zealanders and are central to our economic welfare and our distinctive national brand. They give us our sense of place.

But we are rapidly losing many of our special landscapes through changing land uses and increasing demand for development. The beaches of the Far North, Auckland's Waitakere Ranges, the Coromandel Peninsula, the Marlborough Sounds, the Wakatipu and Wanaka basins, as well as other parts of the South Island High Country, are all under threat.

The purpose of the conference is to debate the importance of landscape to New Zealanders, explore the loss of our outstanding landscapes, the reasons for that loss, to examine overseas models of landscape protection and to identify better ways to manage our special places.

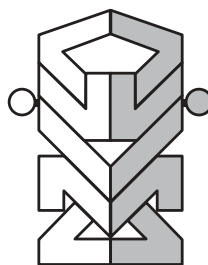

Keynote Speaker

Professor Malcolm Grant

Pro-Vice Chancellor and Professor of Land Economy,
Cambridge University, England

Malcolm Grant is a law graduate from Otago living in the UK. He has been for 20 years the editor of the 7-volume Encyclopedia of Planning Law and Practice, and is consultant editor of the Encyclopedia of Environmental Law. He is an honorary MRICS and MRTPI and was appointed CBE earlier this year. He was chairman of the Local Government Commission for England for 6 years to 2002. He currently chairs the AEBC (the UK Government's advisory commission on biotechnology) and was appointed by the Government last year to lead the UK consultative debate on genetic modification that is now under way. On 1 August 2003 he will move from Cambridge to take up his new appointment as Provost and President of UCL (University College London).

Speakers

Gary Taylor

Chairman, Environmental Defence Society.

Gary Taylor has worked as a resource management consultant and environmental advocate for more than 25 years. He has held elected positions on local and regional councils and appointed positions on the Queen Elizabeth II National Trust, the Auckland Conservation Board, and has worked as a senior advisor on climate change for the Minister of Energy. He is also a company director who has held positions on the Auckland District Health Board and Watercare Services Ltd. In addition to chairing the Board of EDS he is currently a director of Infrastructure Auckland. He has an Honours degree in History and is a Justice of the Peace.

Te Warena Taua

Te Warena Taua has a strong interest in conservation. He has held several ministerial appointments including two terms on the Auckland Conservation Board. He is a current member of the Hauraki Forum. Te Warena was formerly an ethnologist at the Auckland Museum for some thirteen years and is the CEO for Te Kawerau a Maki Trust. The trust is committed to the sustainable management of their peoples relationship with the whenua.

Dr Peter Simpson

Associate Professor of English, *The University of Auckland*

Peter Simpson has taught for the last ten years at the University of Auckland and before that at other universities in New Zealand and Canada. His primary research interests are New Zealand art, literature and cultural history and he has published extensively in these fields.

John Edgar

Sculptor and President, *Waitakere Ranges Protection Society*

John Edgar has been a sculptor for 25 years working mostly with stone in constructions together with metal and glass. His work is internationally recognised for its understanding of the ancient craft of stone working, and for the strong aesthetic component that investigates human interaction with resources in the modern world.

Geoff Park

Concept Leader, *Te Papa*

Geoff Park's landscape interests began with botany and span ecology, conservation and colonial history. These were integrated in his 1995 book *Nga Uruora; The Groves of Life. Ecology & History in a NZ Landscape*. More recently, he has been researching and writing about the valuing of the indigenous landscape.

Dr William Lee

Research Scientist, *Landcare Research*

Bill Lee is research leader of the Biodiversity and Threatened Species programme, and has a special interest in the comparative ecology of rare/widespread plant species, and bird-plant interactions. He currently serves on the Department of Conservation technical advisory committees for the takahe and kakapo.

Simon Swaffield

Professor of Landscape Architecture, *Lincoln University*

Simon Swaffield's first degree was in Geography from St Johns College Cambridge, and he has professional graduate diplomas in Landscape Architecture and Town Planning. Simon has taught at the Centre for Resource Management at Lincoln University since 1982. His research includes theoretical and empirical investigation of landscape perceptions, evaluation methods, and policy responses, and exploration of the contribution that landscape scale thinking can make to the wider goals of sustainable development.

Justice Paul Heath

Judge of the High Court of New Zealand

The Honourable Justice Paul Heath was appointed as a Judge of the High Court of New Zealand in March 2002 and commenced sitting in Auckland in April 2002. Justice Heath speaks from the perspective of a High Court Judge who, in the course of his duties, hears both judicial review applications and appeals from the Environment Court on matters arising out of the application of the Resource Management Act 1991.

Richard Brabant

Barrister

Richard Brabant is a barrister specialising in environmental law. His practice is part of Environmental Law Chambers based at Auckland which is a specialist chambers comprising three barristers all of whom specialise in that field of work. He has been a barrister practising solely in environmental law and administrative law matters since 1992.

Judge Laurie Newhook

Environment Court Judge

Judge Newhook was appointed to the Environment Court in August 2001. Prior to that he was a lawyer specialising in resource management, planning, and civil litigation for almost 30 years. In that capacity he represented councils, land owners, iwi groups, public interest groups, and private individuals before courts and other hearing bodies throughout New Zealand. He was a foundation director of EDS.

Stephen Brown

Landscape Architect and Director of EDS

Stephen has practiced as a landscape architect for 21 years. He is responsible for the design aspects of the proposed structure plan for Long Bay, and he has contributed to urban design and development recommendations for areas including Waitakere City's Northern Strategic Growth Area, Albany, Greenhithe, Omokoroa and Rotokauri (north-west Hamilton). He is a past vice president of the NZ Institute of Landscape Architects and on the Executive of EDS.

Ian MacFarlane

General Manager Marketing, *Tourism New Zealand*

Ian is based in Auckland and responsible for managing the marketing department of Tourism New Zealand where he has responsibility for marketing planning, advertising, marketing research, international media, Internet, events and product marketing.

Di Lucas

Di Lucas established a rural-based landscape architecture practice in Canterbury in 1979. Martin has overseen an expansion of the Ministry's responsibilities and size over the last three years with the additional focus given to Culture and Heritage under the current government.

Bob Harvey

Mayor, *Waitakere City Council*

Bob Harvey was one of the key strategists in the largest environmental campaign in New Zealand history, "Save Manapouri", in the early 1970s. He later became campaign advisor for four elections to, and then president of, the New Zealand Labour Party. He has gone on to be one of New Zealand's most environmentally active politicians, leading new Zealand's first ecologically sustainable municipality - Waitakere City eco-city - for over a decade.

Professor Dick Bellamy

Dean of Science, *The University of Auckland*

Dick Bellamy is a scientist and has been a Director of the Environmental Defence Society since its formation in the early 1970's. Currently Dick is Dean of Science at the University of Auckland. A long-standing interest in conservation and environmental protection has led to a range of other involvements including a term on the Board of Tongariro National Park and a period on the Auckland Regional Authority (1988-1992), where he served on the Parks, Works and Bus Transport Committees.

Rob Fenwick

Rob Fenwick is an environmental businessman with a background in brand marketing and a strong interest in sustainable development and heritage protection, both natural and built. He is a director of EDS.

He is a founding shareholder and director of Living Earth Limited. He was appointed to the Government's working party to develop a national strategy on waste recovery and is a founding member and executive councillor of the NZ Business Council for Sustainable Development.
